Chemical spill slows traffic on Grand

The Laramie Fire Department was forced to block a section of the Fifth Street and Grand Avenue intersection after a chemical spill at Holland Cleaners Thursday morning.

At approximately 11 a.m., the non-flammable dry-cleaning chemical perchloroethylene, driven by steam, burst through a pipe due to a mechanical malfunction in a dry-cleaning machine. The common solvent is used by 70-80 percent of all dry-cleaning businesses.

"We check the machines daily and we log and identify things, but it wasn't identified as a problem," said company owner Karen Holland.

At the time of the spill eight employees were in the building, three of them in the room with the spill. Holland Cleaner employee Steve Graham was the only worker exposed to the skin-irritating chemical. Because of the risks of inhalation he was taken to Iverson Memorial Hospital as a precautionary measure, but returned to work later in the day. No other injuries were reported.

The dry-cleaning process occurs in a self-contained machine, so under normal circumstances no perchloroethylene comes in contact with anything outside the machine. Holland Cleaners' company policy states that the fire department should be called for any perchloroethylene spill over two gallons. The spill was estimated at about five gallons.

Following procedure, employees reportedly shut off the gas and electricity, evacuated the building and had the Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) available to firefighters

as precautionary measures.

"I'm very pleased because my employees handled it properly and the spill was contained," said Holland.

Laramie Fire Department Incident Commander Dan Johnson agreed that Holland Cleaner employees handled the situation very well. "We were able to identify the situation pretty quickly. They were good with the MSDS information and allowed us to cross reference it with our resources and come up with an action plan to start our cleanup."

One of the first precautionary measures for firefighters was to ensure that the chemical hadn't seeped into drainage systems. The dry-cleaning facility is designed to contain a spill and minimize contamination. Even though the chemical was reportedly contained, the Department of Environmental Quality and Molly Welker, Laramie Water Outreach Coordinator, were notified.

The Laramie Fire Department initiated a level-B hazardous materials response for a perchloroethylene spill because of ventilation and inhalation hazards confined to the building.

The six firefighters, working in groups of two, cleaned up the area by approximately 4 p.m. and turned the building back over to the owner. "It wasn't as much an emergency as it was a cleanup process," said Johnson.

This has been the only spill reported by Holland Cleaners since they opened in 1987. The company has another dry-cleaning machine in working order and has resumed business. Some of the clothes were sprayed with perchloroethylene, but are re-cleanable and didn't suffer any damage.

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Research supports limited medical use of embryonic stem cells

Texas — President Bush Thursday night announced federal funding for embryonic stem cell research. Ending the divisive debate on the ethical concerns about creating and improving

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embryos that already have been destroyed.

The president, an opponent of abortion, said he would prohibit the use of federal funds to create any new lines of human embryonic stem cells. He said it was important that "we pay attention to the moral concerns of the new frontier."

Even though he sought middle ground on the complex political and moral issue, Bush's remarks triggered criticism, muted from supporters of research, forceful from opponents.

"The trade-off he has announced is morally unacceptable," said Bishop Joseph A. Fiorenza, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. "It allows our nation's research enterprise to cultivate a disrespect for human life."

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., a supporter of research, welcomed Bush's decision as "an important step forward." But, he added, "it doesn't go far enough to fulfill the lifesaving potential of this promising new medical research."

Stem cells are capable of developing into any of the body's organs but not into a complete individual. These cells form inside an embryo a few days after fertilization.

By properly nurturing embryonic stem cells, experts believe

they can grow new cells to restore ailing organs in chronically ill patients. For instance, new insulin-producing cells could be grown, perhaps to cure diabetes. Each stem cell line comes from an individual embryo that can be duplicated an infinite number of times. The procedure kills the embryo.

Despite claims from some conservative critics, White House aides insisted the president had not broken a campaign pledge. Running for the White House, Bush said he "opposed research that involves destroying a living human embryo."

Bush made his speech from a house on his Texas ranch, the flat landscape visible through the window behind him. Earlier in the day, and a thousand miles away, opponents of stem cell research marched outside the White House to register their concerns.

To soften the news to his conservative critics, Bush said he was creating a president's council — led by conservative bioethicist Leon Kass of the University of Chicago — to monitor the research and recommend guidelines and regulations. Other ethicists, scientists, doctors, lawyers and theologians will also be named to the council.

In his speech, Bush said he had read and consulted widely

before reaching his decision. In a politically poignant reference, he said he had heard from former first lady Nancy Reagan, an opponent of abortion who supports research. Her husband was a staunch opponent of abortion who suffers from Alzheimer's disease, one of the illnesses that scientists hope to conquer through stem cell research.

"As I thought through this issue I kept returning to two fundamental questions," Bush said.

"First, are these frozen embryos human life and therefore something precious to be protected? And second, if they're going to be destroyed anyway, shouldn't they be used for a greater good, for research that has the potential to save and improve other lives?"

In reaching his decision, Bush sorted through conflicting advice from ethicists, anti-abortionists, advocates for the ill, researchers and Pope John Paul II.

Major researchers in the field had estimated that there were only about a dozen stem cell lines in existence, and that some of those would not meet strict National Institutes of Health standards for research. Bush said, however, that there are more than 60 existing lines that met his criteria for research.

Suicide bombing in Jerusalem pizza restaurant kills 15

JERUSALEM — A Palestinian suicide bomber detonated a nail-studded explosive inside a crowded Jerusalem pizzeria at lunchtime Thursday, killing 15 people, wounding almost 90 and provoking a wave of Israeli outrage. One of the dead was an American woman.

Hours after the bombing, Israel launched several nighttime raids that focused primarily on driving the Palestinian leadership out of disputed east Jerusalem. Palestinian officials said Israeli jets destroyed a police building in the West Bank.

Islamic Jihad and Hamas, militant Palestinian groups that have been carrying out bomb attacks against Israel for years, both claimed responsibility for the bombing at Sbarro, a New York-based chain.

Most of the dead were Israelis, but they included a Brazilian man, Giora Balash, 60 and at least one American, a pregnant school teacher, identified by police as Judith Shoshana Greenbaum, 31, of Passaic, N.J.

Greenbaum's parents condemned the act and called President Bush to support Israel's defense efforts.

"In order to make a political point, terrorists murdered my only daughter and her future child," said her father, Al Hayman, in a brief statement read at his Hollywood, Calif. home as his wife, Shifra, wept at his side.

Hanna Tova Nachembo, 31, of New York City, was critically wounded with shrapnel to her chest, according to Rafi Avi Weiss of the Hebrew Institute of Riverdale in the Bronx.

As Israelis mourned the deaths and hospitals struggled to care for the critically injured, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon faced a major decision on how to respond to the attack, the second deadliest in more than a month of fighting.

Early Friday, Jerusalem police detained seven Palestinians as they moved to close the restaurant, the main Palestinian offices in the eastern part of the city. Palestinians at the Oriental House as the forerunner of a future Palestinian government complex in the city.

Wyoming in brief

Chemical spill prompts street closure LARAMIE — A chemical spill at a dry cleaner Thursday prompted a building evacuation and partly shut down Fifth Street and Grand Avenue.

A malfunctioning dry cleaning machine caused about five gallons of perchloroethylene to burst through a pipe at Holland Cleaners at about 11 a.m.

No one was injured in the spill. One employee at was taken to Ivinson Memorial Hospital as a precaution.

The chemical is a chlorinated solvent that can cause liver and kidney damage.

The Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality and Laramie Fire Department responded to clean up and make sure the chemical did not seep into drainage systems.

Holland Cleaners was able to resume business about five hours later.

Power outage spreads through CheyenneCHEYENNE — A substation malfunction cut power to 15,508 homes and businesses in and around Cheyenne for about an hour Friday.

The 4:15 p.m. outage resulted from a transmission failure at a substation west of town, said Bill Pomeroy, spokesman for Xcel Energy-Cheyenne Light.

Western Area Power Administration of Loveland, Colo., which provides transmission capability to the Xcel Energy-Cheyenne Light substation, fixed the problem, he said.

Power was restored after an hour and seven minutes. The substation serves downtown, southern and western Cheyenne and some outlying areas.
Casper hospital pursues links in Lusk, Worland CASPER — Wyoming Medical Center has been pursuing relationships with health care organizations in Worland and Lusk, the new hospital CEO said.

The hospital has already entered relationships with health care organizations in Riverton, Lander and Rock Springs.

Programs in towns outside Casper can grow if Wyoming Medical Center can provide unique and strong specialist programs, James Gardner said.

In Casper, the hospital also has nearly completed a \$48 million building program including a new east wing, emergency room, main entrance and surgical center.

Wyoming Medical Center is a nonprofit hospital owned by Natrona County.

Before joining the hospital, Gardner directed a 556-bed facility in Lake Charles, La., and worked for Christus Health Systems for 10 years. Road work scheduled for Grand Teton MOOSE — Work on two sections of Gros Ventre Road in Grand Teton National Park is scheduled to begin Monday.

On Monday and Tuesday, crews plan to chip seal the road from the parks east boundary with Bridger-Teton National Forest past the town of Kelly to the junction of U.S. 89-191.

Wednesday, chip sealing will be done from U.S. 89-191 west to the Spring Gulch Road junction. All road work is expected to be done by late Wednesday, according to park officials.

Delays of up to 15 minutes can be expected during the construction hours of 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Cheyenne police seek bank robber CHEYENNE — Police were looking for the robber of a bank branch inside an Albertsons grocery store.

The robbery happened around 7 p.m. Thursday at an American National Bank annex, according to Sgt. Monti Allsop.

A preliminary investigation shows the robber left on foot with an undetermined amount of cash.

The case has been turned over to police detectives and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. 2 men nabbed in child porn sting CHEYENNE — Two Wyoming men have been arrested as part of what federal officials say is the largest child pornography sting in the nations history.

Matthew D. Schutz, 21, of Cheyenne, and Donald W. Lytle, 55, of Green River, are each charged with 10 counts of child sexual exploitation. They face up to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each count.

Investigators said Schutz and Lytle had links to Landslide Productions Inc., a Fort Worth, Texas, Internet company owned by Thomas and Janice Reedy.

DCI agents searched Schutzs home in March. They seized computer components from which they allegedly accessed 184 images of children under 18 involved in explicitly sexual conduct.

Stephen Miller, deputy director of the state Division of Criminal Investigation, said a total of eight people are being investigated in Wyoming. He expected more arrests.

We were able to identify 63 people in Wyoming who had at one point or another accessed this Internet Web site in Texas, he said.

Seventeen of those people live in Cheyenne.

The Reedys site had at least 250,000 subscribers, many of whom lived overseas. The site allegedly displayed and distributed child pornography, mostly from Russia and Indonesia but some from the United States.

Landslide allegedly grossed up to \$1.4 million in one month alone, mostly profits from the \$29.95 monthly fee viewers paid to access child pornography Web sites.

The Reedys were convicted last year of sexual exploitation of minors, distribution of child pornography and other charges. Thomas Reedy, 37, was sentenced to life in prison and Janice Reedy, 32, was sentenced to 14 years.

The couple plans to appeal, according to their lawyer. Sweetwater County weighs tattoo regulations
ROCK SPRINGS — The Sweetwater County Board of Health is considering regulations for tattoo and body piercing businesses.

County environmental health officer Chuck Sykes said rules are needed because there are currently no county or state regulations for tattoos or body piercing.

Many parents whose teenagers have gotten tattoos or body piercing have called the health department but there is nothing officials can do until regulations are enacted, he said.

Sykes believes there are more people working in the tattoo and body piercing business than those working at the two or three tattoo parlors in the county.

He said he was recently in a trailer park on an unrelated matter and saw a tattoo sign in the window of one trailer.

Sykes said health board officials have been considering tattoo and body piercing regulations for some time and that is the reason he wrote the draft document for board members to review.

One question that has arisen is whether the law could set an age limit for getting tattoos. A section of the draft prohibits tattoos for anyone under 18 without the written, notarized consent and presence of a parent or guardian.
Jail committee looks for architect
RAWLINS — A committee has begun seeking an architect to design a new Carbon County jail.

The Jail Committee hopes to find an architect by mid-October to complete the design by February, Carbon County Sheriff Jerry Colson told county commissioners recently.

Voorhis and Associates consulting firm of Lafayette, Colo., is evaluating possible jail sites. County-owned land in Rawlins near the fairgrounds is favored.

The firm is also working with sheriffs and detention officials on how to arrange the jail for the best supervision of inmates.

The current 60-year-old jail on the fourth floor of the courthouse was built to house 44 prisoners but holds about 28 because of a 1987 federal consent decree. The decree was the result of a 1986 federal lawsuit concerning overcrowding.


